

"Getting Started" Round

The Getting Started round seeks solutions that will address barriers to housing supply by improving pre-development processes for housing that is affordable.

Stage 1: Concept development and initial application

Stage 2: Project plan and final application

Pre-development activities include everything that brings a housing project from idea to the start of construction. These may include project planning, approvals, obtaining financing, public consultations, etc. The Getting Started round is open to solutions that focus on pre-development activities for new construction, as well as conversion or redevelopment of existing supply to meet current needs.

The Getting Started round encourages applicants to identify and propose solutions that seek to upend business-as-usual and advance reconciliation and equity.

Challenge Statement

We are challenging you to create implementable, local solutions that improve pre-development of housing that is affordable.



- Understand key dates, proposal requirements, scope, and eligibility
- Pay attention to assessment methods
- Be aware of cost restrictions → What can't be paid for?
- Note announcement info and plan accordingly



- Username and password not required
- Familiarize yourself with the Application Form in advance
- Save your work online or work offline until you are ready to submit
- Character count countdown provided as you complete each response
- Note: All questions are mandatory and incomplete forms will not be evaluated

Section I: Application Information

- Lead applicant (legal entity)
- Double check the contact details avoid using auto-fill

Section I: Application Information (contd.)

1.2 Summary Description of the Solution (1300 Characters)

Basic details about your solution:

What barriers will be addressed?
How and where will it be implemented?



This information will be used to match appropriate evaluators to your application.

- Make sure to include <u>KEY WORDS</u>
- Do <u>NOT</u> try to tell all your story here you will have more space in other sections
- Keep it simple and understandable make every character count
- You may want to complete this section <u>last</u>



Section II: The Problem

2.1 Describe the Barriers in Pre-Development Process (4500 Characters)

What is the barrier?

Idea to construction, planning, approvals, financing etc.

Where does the barrier exist?

Geographic areas (neighbourhood, community, etc.)

What is the impact of the barrier in that area?

- Provide sufficient context for the barrier you are defining
- Keep in mind that the evaluators might not be familiar with your area or the problem
- While describing the barriers, keep in mind that you'll need to address them in the following sections
- The barrier doesn't have to be related to new construction - keep conversion or redevelopment in mind too



Section III: The Solution

3.1 Detailed Description of Proposed Solution (2500 Characters)

What is your proposed solution?

Describe your solution and anticipated impacts

Where it will be implemented?

Be consistent with the area identified earlier

- Keep your solutions <u>relevant</u> to your identified barriers
- Do not try to address all other possible issues – stick to what you have mentioned
- Do you remember the appendices? Refer to <u>Appendix C</u> for example solutions



Section III.II: The Solution

3.2 How Will the Proposed Solution Reduce/Eliminate Barriers? (4000 Characters)

What are short-, medium-, and longterm impacts? How will you measure? e.g., reduced time or cost, increased efficiency and/or predictability, or opportunities for collaboration

How is affordability defined in the context of your area?

Consider how solutions will impact along the income spectrum with less emphasis on high earners, investors, and wealthy populations

- Refer to existing <u>local measures of</u> <u>affordability</u>
- Affordability is context dependant provide a clear picture of the solution in your specific geographic area
- Demonstrate your solution's <u>long-term</u> & <u>local</u> <u>impact</u>
- Don't forget the <u>Getting Started Round</u>
 <u>objectives</u> link them to your solution



Section III.III: The Solution

3.3 How Your Solution is Informed by Similar Solutions or Previous Research?(2000 Characters)

How do you build on, adapt, differentiate from previous works?

- A similar solution may have been implemented in a different context explore and find differences and similarities
- Evidence based applications are impactful
- Where possible, please support your ideas with research or facts
- Please do not include any hyperlinks



Section III.IV: The Solution

3.4 Does Your Proposed Solution Have Dependencies That May Affect Implementation?

Yes / No / I don't know

Provide a brief description of your rationale for your choice. (1000 characters)

- Your solution may depend on other variables - identify potential dependencies where possible
- Check all levels of legislation: federal, provincial and municipal
- If you identify a dependency, try to find out who needs to be involved to achieve implementation



Section IV: Applicant Capacity and Feasibility

4.1 Team Members | Capacity to Develop & Deliver the Solution

Relevant experience of each team member (1000 character each)

Describe how you will include the relevant authority for your solution.



You'll need to fill a table for each team member.

- Evaluation panel would like to see
 the <u>relevant and appropriate</u> capacity and
 experience of the team members
- Provide and describe the steps on how you are planning to include the relevant authority for your solution - make sure you are identifying the right organizations or entities here



Section IV.II: Applicant Capacity and Feasibility

4.2 If Shortlisted, What Are The Immediate Next Steps? (2000 characters)

Describe the necessary actions you will take to successfully develop the project plan for the proposed solution during the 6-month Stage 2.

Overall estimate of the total duration of the project.

Provide a broad list of costed activities you will undertake if you are shortlisted.

- Avoid unrealistic timelines your next steps should be <u>feasible</u>
- Cost-estimated activities should be also <u>realistic</u>, <u>logically</u> <u>organized</u> and <u>comprehensive</u>
- Final costing is <u>not</u> required at this stage

4.3 How will your solution incorporate people-centered design? (2500 characters)

What's your approach to engage with different groups?

- Please (re)visit <u>Appendix B</u>
- "Meaningful, fair, and impactful solutions without unintentionally creating hurdles that would impact sections, segments, or proportions of the population"
- What are people-centered considerations for your solutions, sources, consultation, implementation process, and milestones & conclusions?



Section V: Additional Information, and Diversity and Inclusion
